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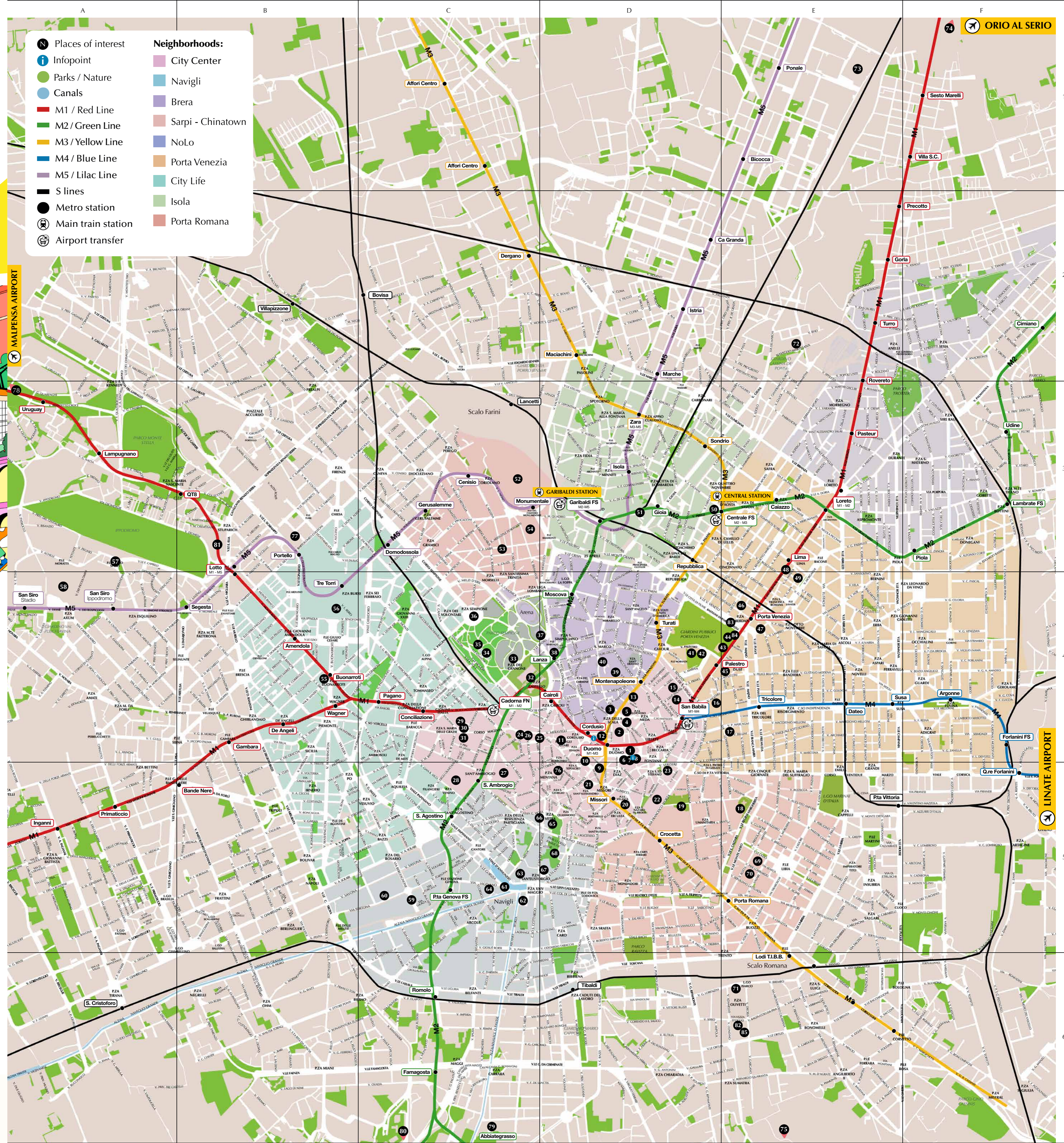


Map of Milano

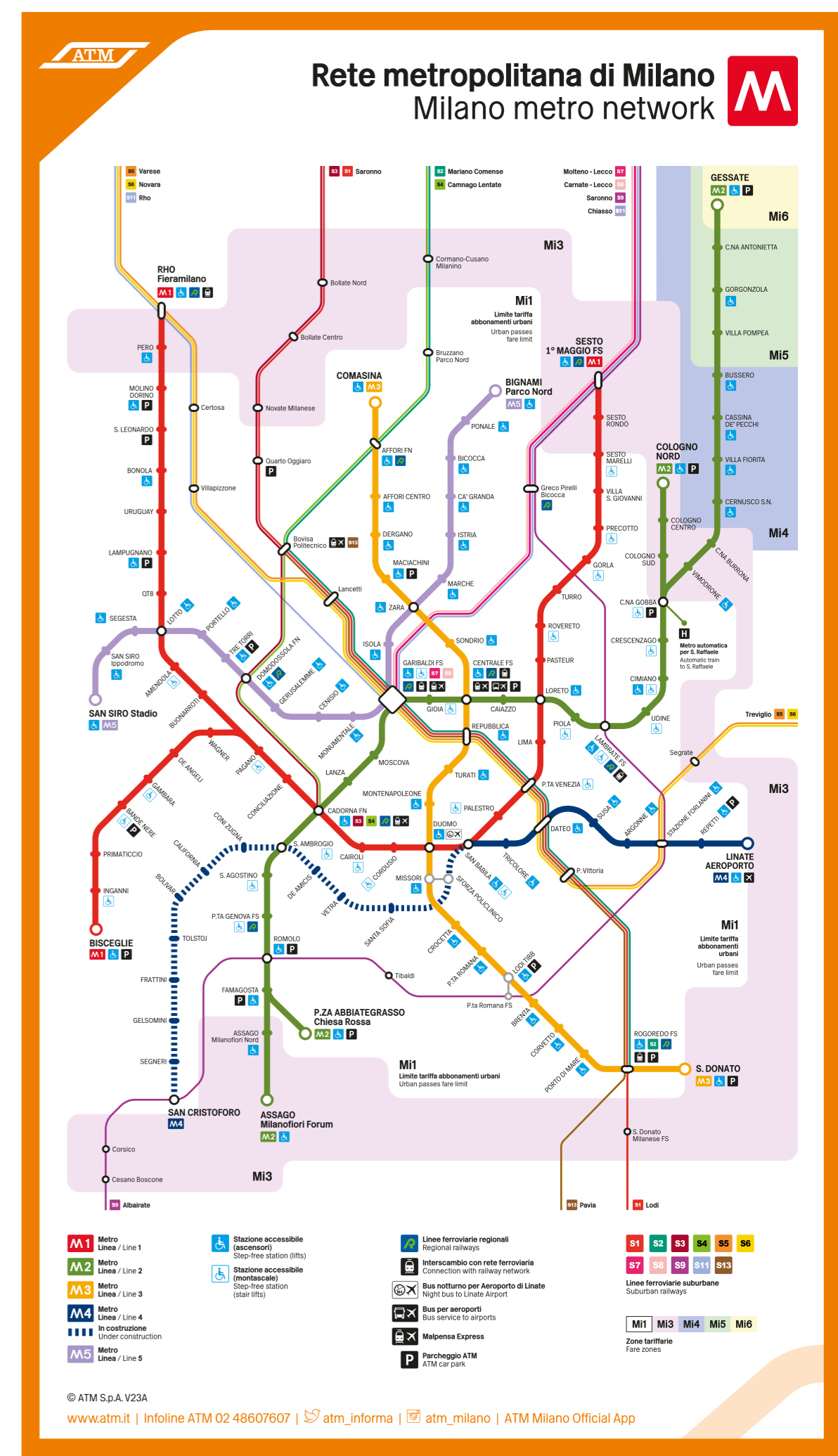

Explore the city and choose your favorite neighborhood.



Brera is the art district of Milano. You will find cobbled alleys, unique boutiques, historic restaurants, and the same-name Pinacoteca which houses immortal paintings. Here you can experience nightlife on a human scale in its many **cafés and restaurants**. Intriguing alleys and mesmerizing squares offer perfect opportunities for suggestive photos.

Milano has the second largest **Chinatown** in Europe, and its history begins a century ago. Via Sarpi is the main pedestrian thoroughfare of the neighborhood; Chinese **gastronomy** is everywhere with specialized restaurants, supermarkets and dumpling shops, but there's also pizzerias and garment stores, patisseries and wine shops. Via Sarpi is the place where everybody likes to hang out at night.

The Navigli are two **fresh-water canals** that enter the city from the south and southwest: the **Naviglio Grande** and the **Naviglio Pavese**, which flow into the **Darsena**, Milano's ancient river port, near the Porta Ticinese gate. From there Corso di Porta Ticinese takes you to the Colonne di San Lorenzo, also reachable by tram or on foot from Via Torino and Duomo. Navigli and Colonne is where the Milanese go when they want to spend a night out.

Multicultural and queer, Porta Venezia has all the best Milano can offer: green parks, cool bars, East African cuisine, elegant architecture, great shopping (M1 metro stations: Palestro, P.ta Venezia, Lima). Set just outside the city center, it is the **rainbow neighborhood** where you can be free to be who you want. Built in the **Art Nouveau and Futurist** eras, Porta Venezia hosts unique modernist villas in the neoclassical district facing the Giardini Pubblici, the local public gardens.

Set between the bridges over the tracks of the Central Station and the Viale Monza and Via Padova avenues north of Piazzale Loreto, Nolo is the happening neighborhood for the city's **creative class and urban subcultures**, replete with tasty eateries, cheap bars and graffiti displays. It has the best art house cinema in Milano, in addition to bicycle shops, vegan cafés, Peruvian restaurants and rainbow squares.

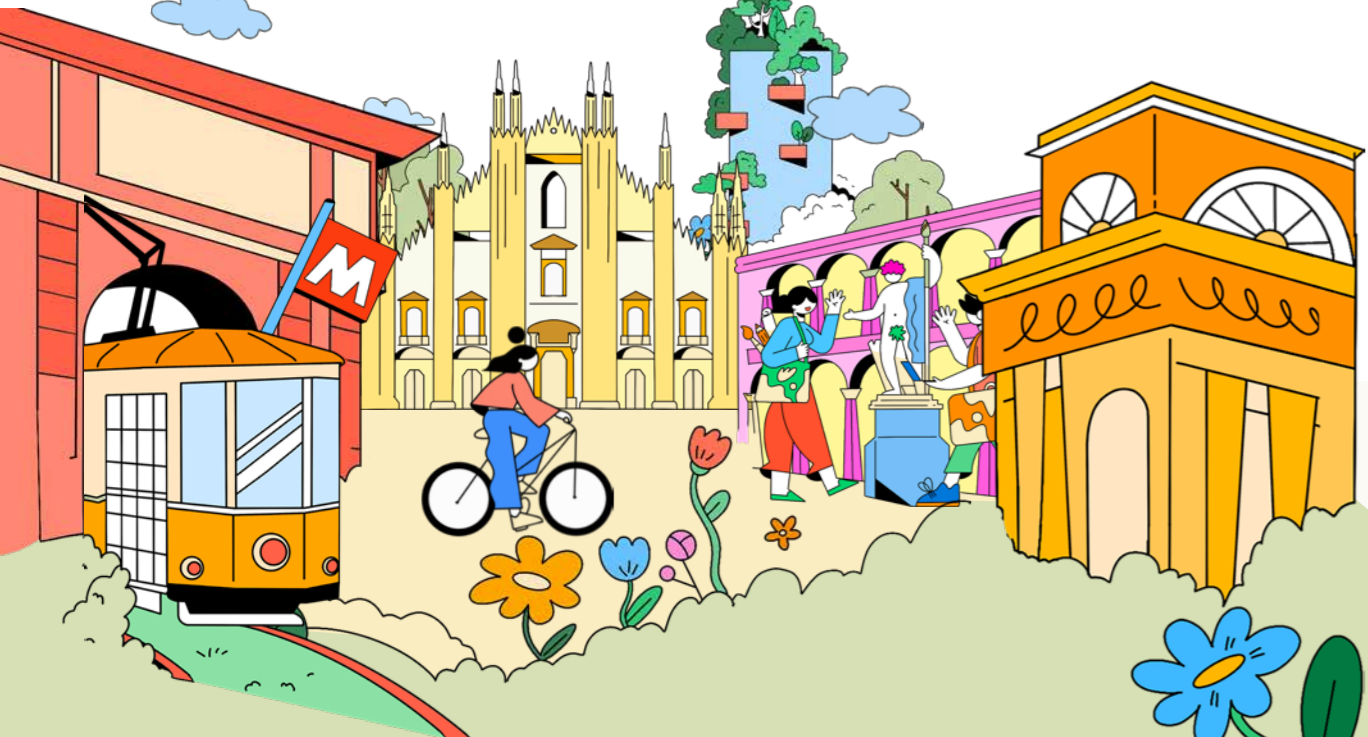
The district develops south of the same-name 16th-century gate in the Spanish walls. It has its own food district replete with wine bars, regional and ethnic **restaurants** and a buzzing weekly market (Fridays). Populated by professionals and students, Porta Romana is one of the most enjoyable and attractive neighborhoods of the city.

Isola, the **island**, so called because it is isolated by the railway tracks from the rest of the city, acts as an **urban bridge** between the old Milano of railings houses and the new Milano of Italy's tallest skyscrapers in Porta Nuova. Isola proper is a neighborhood of young **creatives** and alternative families, dotted by bars and cafés, markets and associations, where you can embrace new cultural trends and be a protagonist of change in the city under the shadow of the **Vertical Forest**.

This is the latest project to have transformed the aesthetics of Milano, inaugurated during Expo 2015. The **three skyscrapers** by Hadid, Libeskind, Isozaki are clearly visible from many areas of the city. Around the three towers rises the CityLife luxury district, a cluster of sparkling residential condos and office buildings, set around a ritzy shopping mall and a vast park. Your visit to Milano is not complete without a stop at CityLife.

Duomo, Galleria and Scala are the **essentials** of any trip to Milano. Take in the views from the roof or ground of the Duomo, shop at the luxurious glass-and-iron arcade, and experience the world-renowned temple of opera music. Stroll along the popular shopping street Corso Vittorio Emanuele, where global brands have their stores (M1 S. Babila). Don't forget to explore the Fashion Quadrangle for a taste of refined and daring style.

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| <p>5 THINGS TO DO IN BRERA</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Feast your eyes on the art of Mantegna, Hayez and Raffaello at Pinacoteca di Brera [40] (M2 Lanza). Stop for a coffee in Piazza del Carmine, then have risotto alla milanese for lunch in one of the many fine eateries around Via San Marco. Enter the art shops and design stores that make Brera one of the artiest of Milanese taste. Lose yourself in the alleys traveled by the protagonists of Italian contemporary art, from Via della Madonnina to Via Fiori Chiari and Via Solferino. Take a walk in Parco Sempione [33], climb on Torre Branca and visit the Triennale Museum of Art [34], Architecture and Design, with the fountain designed by De Chirico. | <p>5 THINGS TO DO IN SARPI - CHINATOWN</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Walk down Via Paolo Sarpi [53], the longest pedestrianized street of the city, for a street food bonanza: bao sandwiches, dumplings, ravioli, tacos, Sicilian cannoli - just choose your favorite! Pay homage to Milanese design: the ADI Design Museum [54] features all the slick products that have made the history of international design (M5 Monumentale). Visit the largest open-air museum in the city: the Cimitero Monumentale [52], a place that keeps the memory of the individuals that made the city great. Take a break in the Lea Garofalo community gardens, a jewel of tranquility near the triangular skyscraper. Have a noisy drink in Via Cesare Cesariano, where the locals like to hang out. | <p>5 THINGS TO DO IN NAVIGLI</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Enjoy a true Milanese aperitivo on a canal bridge at sunset, basking into the magical atmosphere of the lights and the water of the Navigli [61]. Join the youthful crowd at the Colonne [66], drinking and chatting by Roman columns in front of the vast Basilica of San Lorenzo [65]: it only happens in Milano. Visit the Tortona Design District beyond the Porta Genova train station (M2 P.ta Genova FS). Along Via Tortona and Via Savona, in an industrial landscape, there is a cool succession of ateliers, showrooms, bar lounges, select diners and fashion hotels. Visit MUDEC [60], the museum of world art and cultures. Then check out an event or a party, or just hook your laptop and sip a cup of tea at BASE, the creative innovation space, in the former Ansaldo factory. Grab a bike or enjoy a boat tour and see how far into the Lombard countryside the Navigli canals can take you. | <p>5 THINGS TO DO IN PORTA VENEZIA</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Relax at Giardini Pubblici, with the Natural History Museum [43] and the Planetarium [44], or be amazed by Villa Necchi Campiglio [16] and Villa Invernizzi [45] (with pink flamingos in its garden). Walk down Via Melzo to reach Via Malpighi and be amazed by the masterpiece of the Milanese Liberty style of architecture, Casa Galimberti [47]. Do power shopping in Corso Buenos Aires [48]: one of the longest shopping avenues in Europe. Food and drinks! From Eritrean zighini to a taste of ramen, from gourmet vegan to Italian cuisine, Porta Venezia has it all. A drink in a queer bar in Via Lecco [46] or a glass of orange wine in a natural wine bar of the area can be the perfect end of your night out. Walk down Via Plinio, reach Bar Basso, an institution which invented Neogoni Shagiato, and beyond that you enter Città Studi, the modernist university district dominated by Politecnico and Statale. | <p>5 THINGS TO DO IN NOLO</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Jump on Tram #1 and get off at Liberty-style Piazza Morbegno: choose one of the local venues to get the best perspective on the architecture of the square while you sip your drink or read your book. Be wowed by the street art of Via Pontano and Vico del Fontanile. Relax in the green areas of the neighborhood: the cultured and philanthropic Parco Trotter (M1 Rovereto), with its cascade by the water, popular with cyclists for its bike lanes and teenagers for its amphitheater (Piazza Martiri della Libertà Iracheni). Play ping pong with friends and strangers in Piazza Arcobalena, the most beloved tactic square of the city (M1 Rovereto). Discover the neighborhood's cuisine: ceviche from Peru, noodles from Sichuan, Milanese meatballs. Also, Mercato Crespi hosts plenty of dining opportunities inside the modernist-style covered market (M1 Palestro). | <p>5 THINGS TO DO IN PORTA ROMANA</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Watch the carps swimming in the baroque fish bath of the luscious Giardini della Guastalla [19], behind the Medieval cloisters of the State University. Hungry for real Italian food? Find restaurants from all regions of the Boot in Porta Romana. For a quick lunch, discover Milano's most famous roast chicken joint in Piazza Buzzi. Jog along in the Ravizza park by the sprawling Bocconi campus. In for a dip! In Porta Romana there are beautiful swimming pools and spas where you can refresh and relax while sipping a sofit drink. South of Piazzale Lodi (M3 Lodi TIBB), there's the urban future of Milano, with the Parco Romana project which will host the Olympic Village of the 2026 Winter Games, and connect Fondazione Prada [71], one of Europe's hotspots for contemporary visual arts (M3 Lodi T.I.B.B.), to Porta Romana through a vast park. The Prada tower offers a privileged view of the city's southern half. | <p>5 THINGS TO DO IN ISOLA</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Buy food or dine at the brand new Mercato Isola, a completely renovated covered market that offers all kinds of gourmet foods and fine delicatessen (M3 Zara). Expand your green mind at BAM Biblioteca degli Alberi [51] (M5 Isola), the botanical park with walkways going to Piazza Gae Aulenti, the plaza surrounded by skyscrapers and global brands where you can literally walk on water (M2/M5 Garibaldi). Visit the shops in Via Borsieri and Via Thaon de Revel: from ceramics to jewel designers, craftsmanship is the soul of Isola. Want to chill out in a different environment? Try one of the benches of Isola del Pepe Verde, a haven for eco-activism. There's also Piazzale Archinto nearby, a square full of bars where the locals like to hang out. An elegant, alternative, vegan aperitivo? A selection of greats or sublime wines? Isola has it. Then it's time for a dance in Via Valtellina (M3 Maciachini). | <p>5 THINGS TO DO IN CITY LIFE</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Discover all the works of Artline: stroll along the contemporary art park looking for its many sculptures and installations. Time for shopping! Multi-brand stores, food delicacies and movie showings: all at the CityLife Shopping District [56], Milano's most sophisticated mall (M5 Tre Torri). Lay down on the grass of Parco delle Tre Torri [56] to admire the three skyscrapers designed by architects of world renown. Check out the MiCo Convention Center [77] and its incredible vaporwave roofing which seems taken straight out of a sci-fi movie (M5 Portello). Enjoy a stroll amid the leafy and elegant palazzos of Via Pagano, and shop at the fine boutiques of Corso Vercelli. | <p>5 THINGS TO DO IN CITY CENTER</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Go up the terraces [1] to enjoy a view of the city through the marble spires of the Duomo [1] next to the golden Madonnina. From here you can see your next destination, the Castello Sforzesco [32]. Get emotional at Teatro alla Scala [3] watching an opera or a ballet and marvelling at the breathtaking stage. It's time for shopping! From the Galleria [2] to the Fashion Quadrangle [15]; through Via Montenapoleone you can gape at the windows of the most glittering fashion designers. Pass through the iconic Cinque Vie district [76] to reach the Romanesque Basilica of St. Ambrose [27]. Next to it, the Leonardo Da Vinci Museum of Science and Technology [28] is the perfect family destination. Admire the Last Supper by Leonardo Da Vinci at Santa Maria delle Grazie [30] (M1/M2 Cadorna FN), a world masterpiece. Book your visit in advance! |
